

LAND OF SONG COMES TO TOWN

WINTER storms didn't deter Rhyl's town councillors from flying the flag for Wales.

With much of the country hit by Siberian temperatures and deluged by snow, Rhyl Town Council was determined that the show should go on, sweeping artic temperatures aside to mark St David's Day.

Accompanied by singers and musicians from the Ghostbuskers Community Choir, councillors took to Rhyl High Street to hand out Welsh flags and daffodils to shoppers.

Rhyl Mayor Cllr Alan James: "A warm welcome always awaits Rhyl visitors and shoppers and, despite the country being hit by a severe weather front, we were determined St David's Day should be no different.

"The choir was in fine voice and I think the sing-along and flags created some warm feelings among shoppers on what was a bitterly cold day."

St David's marks the start of the town council's 2018 events programme with stilt walkers in town on Easter Monday and larger community events planned throughout the year.

"This year's community events will largely be held on Rhyl's high street with the aim of driving up footfall in the town centre, supporting businesses and providing an additional experience for shoppers, although we're hoping for warmer weather for the rest of the year!" added Cllr James.
